Following your gut instead of your brain is about being an intuitive writer who doesn't think plot and bios but writes without judgment or fear of failure. By trusting you know how to tell a story. The proof: anytime you are with friends you tell a story about something you saw or experienced. You know where to start, what the hook is, what the reveals are and how it leads up to its climax. Your audience leans in, offering verbal and physical reactions ("He did what?"), until the story builds to it's payoff. In this workshop we'll write with that same sense of knowing and overcome our fear of putting stories to the page.
