

A Message from the County Librarian

These individuals – Joan Berkley Jim Lutz, Ellen Miller and Warren Robinson – were honored for their dedication and long years of service to the community. They each were a member of the Library Board of Directors and served on the Friends of the Library and the Library Foundation boards. Shortly after the recognition, Jim Lutz passed away after a valiant fight against cancer. I would like to dedicate this annual report to Jim. He was an inspiration to us all by his consistent and strong support of library service.



He firmly believed in the power of reading and wanted the Library in his community to be a resource for everyone. We will miss his intellect, humor and support as we strive to seek excellence in the future of Johnson County Library services.

2010 was a year of increased challenges for Johnson County Library. The Library served as a community safety net for families with limited resources and for job seekers who accessed information and completed job applications on library computers. It is evident how important the Library has become in people's daily lives. More visitors came to the Library than ever before. Yet due to the economic downturn, library funding was reduced, impacting staffing levels and programming.



To reduce expenditures, the Library implemented many efficiencies such as eliminating paper overdue notices, introducing a new library catalog, cutting back library programs, and streamlining materials handling. Also, energy-saving design features in the newly renovated Leawood Pioneer Neighborhood Library reduced utility costs.

As we look to the future, funding resources continue to be tight. The Library will focus on maintaining valued core services and will continue to look for ways to reduce expenditures while keeping service strong. Friendly staff will continue to be available to meet library patrons' needs with reading recommendations as well as reliable resources and library materials.

The Library thanks those in the community, especially the Friends of the Library and the Library Foundation, for continued support.

Business Services

Johnson County Library has seen tremendous growth and demand for business services. With the economic downturn, library staff have focused efforts to support those individuals and businesses that have been adversely impacted. Through career tours, GovFest for Entrepreneurs and many résumé classes and career programs, Johnson County residents take advantage of library resources and services to support their businesses, job searches and skill building.

Civic Engagement

Johnson County Library provides a place for people to come together and discuss issues affecting the community and the nation. Civic engagement activities include forums, panel discussions, focus groups and interactive programs . . . everything from "What would you like from the Library" focus groups to a national dialogue with the America Speaks Town Meeting on the economy and the federal budget. The Library is dedicated to providing these opportunities for the community and encourages citizen participation.

Johnson County Library offers various book discussion groups to promote reading, including the "Connect with a Classic" program, in conjunction with the Library's courier truck marketing campaign. This program celebrates classic literary works with programs and book discussions. Participants report that book discussion groups challenge them and stretch their reading boundaries beyond what they would choose on their own. With the new Web Catalog, it is easier than ever for patrons to experience all the Library has to offer.

Cost-Saring Efficiencies

Utilizing a new materials handling process, the Library has achieved an annual savings of approximately \$120,000. Processes that previously required two to four months have been reduced to two to four weeks. The remodeled Leawood Pioneer Neighborhood Library is now serving as a model for other locations. When changes are made within a Neighborhood Library, they will be made according to the cost savings/energy savings realized from this project.



"Following the expansion of Leawood Pioneer

Neighborhood Library, we saw a significant decrease in utility bills that we can attribute to green technology. Prior to the expansion, utilities ran \$33,630 per year. After adding 8,000 square feet, utilities dropped to \$13,431." – Mike Heffernan, Library Facilities Manager

Breaking Records

Johnson County Library continues to set records for the number of people coming into the libraries and the number of items they checked out. In June

2010, the Library experienced a record-breaking month for both:

2009 Patron Visits: 251,733 2010 Patron Visits: 273,721 Increase: 4.5%

2009 Circulation: 653,066 2010 Circulation: 678,734 Increase: 3.9%

"The tight economy is bringing in people searching for jobs and career information or wanting to use computers. Many patrons are cutting back in their personal budgets, and they look to the Library as a free resource for newspapers, magazines and audiovisual materials, as well as books they no longer are able to or want to purchase. Libraries throughout the country serve as a community hub for information and lifelong learning." – Donna Lauffer, County Librarian
